THE LIFE OF ST. KATHERINE OF ALEXANDRIA

Since about the 10th Century veneration for St. Katherine has been marked in the East. Numerous churches were dedicated in her honour. She was venerated as the patroness of maiden and women students, philosophers, preachers, wheelwrights, millers and others.

She was a daughter of a wealthy pagan family of Alexandria, Egypt. She was interested in learning and loved to study deep questions of philosophy and religions. One day she began to read about Christianity and was converted by a vision of Our Lady and the Holy Child.

She was 18 years old when the Emperor Maxentius began persecuting the Christians. Fearlessly, this lovely young Christian girl went to tell him what she thought of his cruelty. When Maxentius' wife Faustina and two hundred soldiers of the guard were converted Katherine was sentenced to be killed on a spiked wheel. This is where the 'Catherine Wheel' comes from. When

she was placed on it the wheel snapped miraculously in two and she was finally beheaded. All the texts of the 'acts' of St. Katherine state that her body was carried by angels to Mount Sinai, where a Church and a Monastery were afterwards built. The image shown of St. Katherine is from our Abbey Church.

Something to think about...

A few years ago, a group of salesmen went to a regional sales convention. They had assured their wives they would be home in plenty of time for Friday night dinner. In their rush to catch the plane home, one of the men accidently knocked over a table which held a display of apples. Apples flew everywhere. Without stopping or looking back, they all managed to reach their plane in time ... all but one. He paused, got in touch with his feelings and experienced a twinge of compassion for the girl whose apple stand was overturned. He told his buddies to go on without him and he would catch a later flight home. Then he returned to the terminal where the apples were all over the floor. He was glad he did. The 16 year old girl was totally blind! She was softly crying, tears running down her cheeks in frustration, and at the same time helplessly groping for her spilled apples as the crowd swirled around her. No one stopped to help her, no one seemed to care about her and her plight. The salesman knelt on the floor with her and gathered up the apples, put them back on the table and helped organise her display. As he did, he noticed that many of them had become battered and bruised; these he sat aside in another basket. When he had finished he pulled out his wallet and said to the girl: "Here please take \$50 for the damage we did today. Are you OK?" she nodded through her tears. He continued on with "I hope we didn't spoil your day too badly." As the salesman started to walk away, the bewildered blind girl called out to him "Mister.." He paused and turned to look into those blind eyes. She continued "Are you Jesus?" He stopped in mid-stride and he wondered. He gently went back and said "No, I am nothing like Jesus – He is good, kind, caring loving, and would never have bumped into your display in the first place." The girl gently nodded "I only asked because I prayed for Jesus to help me gather the apples. He sent you to help me. Thank you for hearing Jesus, Mister." Then slowly he made his way to catch the later flight with that guestion burning and bouncing around in his mind. "Are you Jesus?"

Do people mistake you for Jesus? That's our destiny, is it not? To be so much like Jesus that people cannot tell the difference as we live and interact with a world that is blind to His love. life and grace. You are the apple of His eye, even though you, too, have been bruised by a fall. He stopped what He was doing and picked up you and me on a hill called Calvary and paid in full for our damaged fruit. Let us live like we are worth the price He paid.
